

The Mission of The Lucy Pet Foundation is to reduce pet overpopulation by having mobile spay/neuter clinics across the country and to support causes that benefit animal welfare.

The goal of the Lucy Pet Foundation is to have spay/neuter and adoption mobile clinics in every major city in the country. With one mobile clinic we can spay and neuter over 120 dogs and cats per week. Doing this 48 weeks of the year, means approximately 6,000 animals will be spayed and neutered. This will prevent those animals from adding a minimum of 15,000 new potentially homeless animals to pet overpopulation.

In the U.S. alone, over four million dogs and cats are put down each year in shelters. That's over 80,000 a week. A pregnant dog like Lucy and her pups would likely have been candidates for euthanasia if left on their own.

Most shelters are not equipped with the space or financially able to house and care for a mother and her pups. Left to fend for themselves on the street, they would surely suffer and most would likely not survive.

Daniel the "Miracle Dog"

Daniel, a beagle mix, survived the Alabama gas chamber.



Daniel, at 6 months old, was put into a gas chamber with 17 other dogs. When they opened the door, 17 dogs were dead, but Daniel was still wagging his tail. The operator didn't have the heart to put him back in. The gas chamber is an inhumane form of euthanasia for pets and is still legal in 31 states. We want it banned in all 50 states.

With our goal to have at least 40 spay/neuter and adoption mobile clinics, we can really make a significant dent in pet overpopulation. Your donation will be used to prevent over 15,000 homeless animals from being euthanized alone within one community during the first year, and by year three it is estimated that we can prevent over 500,000 animals from suffering in that same area.

Why the Lucy Pet Foundation?

I visited the Camarillo Animal Shelter and spoke to Barry Fisher, the Chief Deputy Director of Ventura County Healthcare Agency. He gave me a tour of the facility. I was impressed with the genuine love for animals that the staff was showing. Barry told me that the Camarillo Animal Shelter is a shelter that euthanizes for space and he desperately wants to be a "no-kill" shelter. But the problem is that they adopt out 20 animals on the weekend, and pick up 30 animals during the week. It just doesn't stop.

He told me that many people don't spay and neuter their pets, so puppies and kittens just keep multiplying. There are many dogs and cats that roam the streets and keep reproducing. Unless people spay and neuter their pets, the problem is never going to stop.

I promised Barry that I was going to come up with a program that would not only help the problem in his area, but all around the country. That's why the "Lucy Pet Foundation" was created.
